### Local Hero, Local Kindness

Even though the Shaker Heights "Meals on Wheels" program for seniors has temporarily closed during the pandemic, the Cleveland Heights program is continuing to provide low cost

meal delivery service. Forest Hill's own Marlene Perez is the volunteer coordinator for Meals on Wheels in Cleveland Heights and leads a skeleton crew who remains dedicated to continuing services throughout the COVID-19 self-isolation period.

Meals on Wheels is a privately funded community service organization with the mission of providing low cost lunches and dinners to seniors who qualify, primarily the home-bound. They provide a full lunch and a full hot supper four days a week plus one frozen meal for the weekend and purchase their food from the McGregor Home on Lee Blvd. in East Cleveland.

Marlene brings the food to the Fairmount Presbyterian Church where volunteers pack the meals for distribution. Then drivers and other volunteers deliver the meals to Cleveland Hts. homes before noon, following all pandemic social distancing precautions.

It has been their goal to reach out to nearly 1,000 FHHO homes to make certain that no neighbor feels alone or has unmet needs. The volunteers worked very hard and in fact one caller, Sue Kenney's sister-in-law Carol DeLillo Kenney, made 200 calls herself!

Without exception, people receiving these calls were grateful for the outreach. Typical responses were: "Thank you so much for calling"; "That's a wonderful thing you are doing"; "It's great to know there are people in the neighborhood who care enough to call"; and a few said, "You don't know how important this call is to me." Unfortunately, they were unable to reach all 935 FHHO residents due to contacts which need updating.

This isn't the first time that FHHO residents **Sue Kenney** and **Judy Charlick** have organized
volunteers to reach out to residents in our
community. Their work together on the "Aging
Well at Home Resource Guide" which began in 2019
continues to be an appreciated resource.
