Dear Residents of Forest Hill,

To support each other we propose in the warm months to have small groups of volunteers cleaning out weeds and debris from the curbs and streets of our neighborhoods where it is needed.

Bringing Color to the Outside of Your Home can Have a Tremendous Effect on Your Historic Home's Value and Curb Appeal

Forest Hill is an architecturally diverse neighborhood with many prize examples of architectural styles. The Andrew J. Thomas-designed French Normandy homes, the Donald J. Scholz mid-century ranch homes, and the modern designs of noted architect Albert J. Sgro, inspired by Frank Lloyd Wright, are worthy of historic preservation. Because of our protective deed covenants, many streets continue to resemble the original neighborhood from the 1930s, '40s, '50s and '60s.

The historic preservation of mid-century ranches includes keeping the details that make your home special such as unique garage door windows and trim, natural stone and brick materials, clean modern front doors, shutters, and wrought iron trim. Careful palette selection will enhance the unique architectural details that Forest Hill homes are known for having.

Many homeowners choose to paint in the original historic colors. Historic colors can be matched by taking even a small chip for computerized color matching to your favorite paint retailer.

Other residents may want to choose a new palette that includes more current color schemes while still harmonizing with mid-century details. LaTrelle Winston, Events Coordinator and owner of Interior Lifestyles, offers a few examples of color palettes for mid-century ranch exteriors:





1. Sherwin Williams: Summit Gray with Extra White and Greenblack

2. Benjamin Moore: Distant Gray with Harbor Haze and Cool Blue

3. Sherwin Williams: Carriage Door with Windsor Greige, and Thunder Gray.

4. Sherwin Williams: Downing Slate with Downing Straw, Rookwood Antique Gold, and Rookwood Medium Brown
